Caring Corner

Maternal Mental Health

This week our Healing and Wholeness Committee is covering the topic of Maternal Mental Health.



Depression and anxiety during pregnancy and after the birth of a baby is more common than most people know. An estimated 20% of birthing women report experiencing postpartum mood and anxiety disorders but experts believe this number to be much higher. Many women suffer in silence often because of societal pressures to manage their own health and the health of their infant on their own.

Some symptoms of depression during pregnancy and postpartum period include sadness, irritability, exhaustion, fears and worries that won't go away, difficulty with sleeping and eating, and a feeling of overwhelm. Although most mothers experience sleep deprivation and hormonal fluctuations that impact mood, when symptoms persist and make it hard for the individual to function in their everyday life and persist beyond the first two weeks postpartum, it is imperative to seek professional help sooner rather than later.

What to do if you are struggling with perinatal (pregnancy or postpartum) mood or anxiety symptoms:

- Reach out to your healthcare provider and consult about medication options, check thyroid and iron levels that could be contributing to mood changes, or ask for a referral to a therapist with expertise in PMADs (perinatal mood and anxiety disorders).
- If you are looking for confidential support where you can remain anonymous, contact Postpartum Support International. They have a warmline (soon to be hotline with 24/7 support) you can call to receive confidential support and help navigating what to do next.
- Reach out to your friends and family for support. If you are feeling isolated and in need of prayer support
 or delicious meals from your LOC family, call the church office to be connected with one of our support
 ministries!
- Get fresh air and movement! Nourish your body whenever possible.

Get help before your symptoms become a mental health crisis.

A Musical Journey Through Lent, Week 5



Were You There?

African American Spiritual

Were You There? is one of the most popular African American spirituals in denominational churches today. As with most spirituals, the exact origins are difficult to trace since it was a song borne from the communal slave experience. The lyrics are as follows:

Were you there when they crucified my Lord?

The first printed version of *Were You There?* was found in William E. Barton's, "Old Plantation Hymns," published in 1899. The first four verses were the original published words. Verse five was added later. In 1940, it was included in the Episcopal Church hymnal, making it the first spiritual to be included in any major American hymnal.

Were You There? and other spirituals like it represented more than just biblical context. Lyrics were often metaphors to slavery and oppression. For example, in verse two of Were You There?, the cross is described as a "tree." It is thought that the word "tree" was used as a reference to lynchings. This no doubt gave special significance to African Americans who witnessed lynchings, further strengthening the metaphor between Jesus' suffering and slaves' suffering. Later some hymn books would change "tree" to "cross." However, I believe that staying true to the original meaning of this song is important. We cannot discredit the suffering that led to the hymn we love so much today. In his book, "The Cross and the Lynching Tree," James Cone says, "In the mystery of God's revelation, black Christians believed that just knowing that Jesus went through an experience of suffering in a manner similar to theirs gave them faith that God was with them, even in suffering on lynching trees, just as God was present with Jesus in suffering on the cross." Understanding the history and emotional context of this song brings deeper meaning into the lyrics and gives us a different perspective on how we think about these lyrics.

As with other songs of such distinction, *Were You There?* expanded outside the Christian church. For example, Ghandi was reportedly a fan of this song. He said, 'I feel that this song gets to the root of the experience of the entire human race under the spread of the healing wings of suffering." *Were You There?* is a song that reminds us of the responsibility we must take for our own sins, as well as the responsibility we have to ease the suffering of others. Of course, let us remember the suffering Jesus endured for humankind but let us also remember and acknowledge the suffering of the oppressed who wrote this song in the first place.
