

Caring Corner

NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) California has an article



"Mental Health Benefits of Nature" on its website. The article includes links to numerous studies and key findings. There is a growing body of research showing that time in nature, or enjoying pockets of green in urban settings, is good for our mental health. This is true for both adults and children. Get the story, then get outside for some 'green' (or white!) time!

One study, "Green Spaces Aren't Just for Nature – They Boost Our Mental Health Too" states the evidence of positive effects from nature includes studies on specific psychological conditions such as depression, anxiety and mood disorder. Access to nature has also been found to improve sleep and reduce stress, increase happiness and reduce negative emotions, promote positive social interactions and even help generate a sense of meaning to life. Being in green environments boosts various aspects of thinking, including attention, memory and creativity, in people both with and without depression. "The evidence is very solid," says psychologist Marc Berman at the University of Chicago.

Other studies linked in the article include "Stanford Researchers Find Mental Health Prescription: Nature," "Science Confirms You Should Stop and Smell the Roses," "Research Suggests that Mood Disorders Can be Lifted by Spending More Time Outdoors," and "Finding Beauty in the Everyday," among others.

You can start small. Gretchen Rubin, author of *The Happiness Project*, has a challenge for 2023 for her podcast listeners: "Go Outside 23 in 23" which challenges participants to go outside for 23 minutes every day in 2023. It can include anything from walking to bird watching; from yardwork to enjoying your morning coffee on your porch – as long as the door closes behind you, it counts! Check out her website or *Happier* app if you are interested.

Some of us also feel close to God in nature and feel blessed and in awe of His wonderful creation. I encourage you to try to make some time to be outdoors and in touch with nature, even when it requires some bundling up!

In the Garden or I Come to the Garden Alone Text/Tune: C. Austin Miles (1868-1946)

"In the Garden" was written by C. Austin Miles, a former Pharmacist turned Gospel writer. He attended the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and the University of Philadelphia. Miles wrote his first Gospel song in 1892. He became editor and manager of the Hall-Mack publishing company and served them for 37 years (Terry, 2015).

"In the Garden" is a surprisingly polarizing song. While one of my favorite hymns, "In the Garden" is not recognized as a religious song by many. In fact, I noticed that our current Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal does not include "In the Garden," nor does the previous Lutheran hymnal, the Lutheran Book of Worship. Why the controversy? The answer may lie within the text. The lyrics are as follows:

Verse 3ad ofI'd stay in the garden with Him Tho' the night around me besh theirfalling; But He bids me go; thro' the yoice of woe, His voice to me is calling.g.[Refrain]

According to Miles, the text to "In the Garden" was inspired by his favorite bible chapter, John 20:1-18, as well as a vision he experienced while working in his dark room. In Miles' own words:

"One day in March, 1912, … I drew my Bible toward me; it opened at my favorite chapter, John 20 [1-18] … That meeting of Jesus and Mary Magdalene had lost none of its power to charm.

As I read it that day, I seemed to be part of the scene. I became a silent witness to that dramatic moment in Mary's life, when she knelt before her Lord, and cried, "Rabboni!".

My hands were resting in the Bible while I stared at the light blue wall. As the light faded I seemed to be standing at the entrance of a garden, looking down a gently winding path, shaded by olive branches. [The author then describes the arrival of Mary, Peter, and John as they gathered at the tomb, followed by the appearance of Jesus.]

I awakened in full light, gripping the Bible, with muscles tense and nerves vibrating. Under the inspiration of this vision I wrote as quickly as the words could be formed the poem exactly as it has appeared (Hawn, 2019)."

The first aspect of the song people find issue with is the first-person language. Some believe that such a one-sided perspective is not appropriate for a communal song. However, isn't worship a personal experience as well? Yes, we come together as a community, but we all take away something as individuals from our worship experience. And if we only successfully worship together with more communal songs, then hymn classics like, "Blessed Assurance," "I Love to Tell the Story," "Were You There," "Abide with Me." and many others told in a first-person narrative would not be appropriate either.

Some people also find issue with the overly embellished descriptions of the atmosphere as well. The lyrics have even been called "erotic;" almost like a love song. But are we not supposed to feel beauty when experiencing an intense moment with God? This is also not the first time such "flowery" speech has occurred in a hymn. Take "Morning Has Broken" for example: "Morning has broken like the first morning. Blackbird has spoken like the first bird. Praise for the singing, praise for the morning. Praise for them springing fresh from the world...etc." While written in 1931, later than "In the Garden," "Morning Has Broken" has similarly poetic lyrics but is still considered a "credible" hymn/religious song.

The last issue some people have with "In the Garden" lies within the lyric, "And the joy we share as we tarry there, None other has ever known." Some criticize this as a selfish expression. How can we sing about a relationship with the Lord that no one else has experienced? What makes our experience so special? However, according to the author himself, "In the Garden" is a song about Mary Magdalene, encountering the Risen Christ near the empty tomb. So, "None other" in this case would be about the joy of being the first witness to the Resurrection of Jesus. Even without the author's context, though, this lyric can still be appropriate. Each person's experience with God is different from another person. So, I do not fully know your personal experience with God, and you do not fully know mine.

With all this being said, a song's interpretation is personal. "In the Garden" feels appropriately religious to me but may not to you. And that is fine! That is why the subjectiveness of music is so fun. I encourage everyone to discuss this song and any other songs that speak to you!

Funeral Ministry Serving the Bereaved

Helping people in their time of need is central to what we do as a church. And, most certainly, when there is a death, this is one of those important times. There is pastoral care extended, members reach out to offer condolences and love, a celebration of life service is planned, and often there is a reception that follows so that the family can spend some extra time with their guests.

All of this takes a group of dedicated members to help each time there is a funeral/reception. Generally, specific arrangements have been previously made, and most food items (if there is a lunch) are delivered to the church beforehand. So, Funeral Ministry Team Members show up early, help to set the tables, get food and beverages arranged, provide hospitality (even some direction-giving if needed), and then serve the

food, desserts, or beverages when guests arrive.

Generally, family will have decided upon either a light meal (most of that food delivered by Coborn's) or desserts and beverage. In both of those cases we invite Light of Christ members to make and deliver to the church a variety of desserts.

Dishes are cleared and run through the dishwasher, dried and put away. Tables are wiped clean. Other items put back in place.

The number of Funeral Ministry Team members varies depending upon the size of the funeral, but generally between 6 and 10 people are needed.

Our hope is to include new folks in this ministry and these tasks. So, please pray about serving at some point. Ginny Iverson has been the long-time coordinator of this ministry. And she would like to train in someone new to take the reins.
